Thanks need to be extended to all staff and students who have had their school routines interrupted beginning at the start of June when the library closed in order to completely empty the space before construction begins.

The renovation includes a complete re-design of the space. The circulation desk will be relocated, as will the learning spaces, book shelves and computers. The conference room and half of the teacher-librarian office will be combined to create a new class-room type space. A "hack lab" or "maker space" (if you are unfamiliar with these terms, ask your teenage son/daughter!) will be added and it will have a 3D printer. All new furniture, shelving, flooring, lighting, computers, security system, and ceiling design are part of the renovation. We can't wait to see the finished product, which is to be completed by the beginning of September. Be sure to come by to see the new ND Library Learning Commons this fall!

ND's oldest Specialist High Skills Major program continues to steam ahead with hopes and plans for an even better year this fall. The Business SHSM enables ND students to gain sector-specific skills and knowledge and helps them focus on graduation and on pursuing their postsecondary goals. This specialist program gives students a potential leg-up on the competition for both jobs and for spots at college/university.

Even students taking courses that are not pure business can also potentially earn a Business Specialist. Courses that can be used towards a Business SHSM designation include Computer Science, Computer Engineering, Web Design and even Construction Technology.

All students in ND's Business SHSM participate in reach-ahead opportunities to learn from the experience of business career professionals and post-secondary institutions. In addition, students will also gain certification in CPR, First Aid, Customer Service, WHMIS, Ergonomics and Counterfeit Detection which will not only be beneficial in their future careers but also makes them more marketable for part time or summer jobs.

As a integral part of the Business SHSM program, students also earn two credits in a subject related co-op placement to further enhance their learning and help provide them with marketable skills for their future.



Vimy Ridge 100th Anniversary, April 2017.



On July 1, 1867, we became a nation, 'The Dominion of Canada'. On April 9, 1917, Canada became a country and demonstrated to the world how great it was and would become. Previous attempts to take the Vimy Ridge from the Germans in World War I resulted in over 150,000 French and British casualties and no success. At daybreak on April 9, 1917, fighting for the first time as one all Canadian force, the greatest battle in our history began. And four days later, at a cost of more than 10,600 lives, we had taken Vimy Ridge, an unprecedented Canadian victory.

April 9, 2017 will mark the 100th Anniversary of the battle that changed Canada, and we will join thousands of other Canadian students in France to celebrate and honor those that served, all part of the **EF Education First program.** On April 3, 2017, we will depart for this once in a lifetime experience, providing our students with the opportunity to not just study history, but to write and experience it. They will be aware of not just their Canadian citizenship, but their roles as global citizens.
