Frequently Asked Questions

Is going to college the only way to become an apprentice?
What benefit, if any, is there to attending college for a skilled trades program?

There are multiple pathways to apprenticeship. In every case, students will require an apprenticeship sponsor. The most direct path to a sponsor is to approach an employer or union hall.

In terms of benefits, college is a great way to develop theoretical knowledge from in-class learning, specific experience and a skillset that makes students more attractive to potential sponsors.

Can an individual switch from one skilled trades program to another? If yes, how does it work?

To participate in an apprenticeship program, the individual is required to have the skills and experience necessary to that specific trade. They should be able to switch to their new trade of choice if they have the right qualifications and a sponsor for the apprenticeship.

How can a student access a trade union?

Once the student identifies their trade of interest, the student can contact the trade union that represents their trade of interest. The list of unions commonly on OPG sites are listed in this package.

What are the most in-demand trades?

Based on information from Canada.ca ¹, the top projected in-demand skilled trades in Canada from 2022-2026 include: Industrial Electrician, Industrial Mechanic (Millwright), Painter & Decorator, Welder.

The top projected in-demand trades in Ontario from 2022-2026 are: Heavy Duty Equipment Technician, Industrial Electrician, Painter & Decorator, Welder.

What is the recently announced Grade 11 apprenticeship pathway about? How does the new change impact the apprenticeship process?

The Ontario Government recently announced that they will allow students in grade 11 to transition to full-time, skilled trades apprenticeship program ². Upon receiving their Certificate of Apprenticeship, students can apply for their Ontario Secondary School Diploma as mature students.

More information / consultation is scheduled for the fall of 2023 as Ontario is considering lowering the grade 12 requirements for some trades. This change means that more students will be able to enter the trades faster than ever before to help build Ontario.

Support for Apprentices in any Trade Tools Grant

Registered apprentices for at least 12 months in Construction Trades can get \$600 for tools. For more information, visit: ontario.ca/page/financial-supports-apprentices

Apprentice Development Benefit

This funding provides support to full-time apprentices, with in-class training at a ministry-approved training delivery agent. For more information, visit: ontario.ca/page/financial-supports-apprentices


Apprenticeship Completion Grant



List of Programs You Need to Know



Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP)

What is OYAP?

OYAP is a specialized program that allows high school students to explore apprenticeship and consider careers in the skilled trades, generally starting in Grade 11 or Grade 12 through a co-op program.

Who qualifies?

- · At least 15 years of age
- Have successfully completed a minimum of 14 credits toward a high school diploma
- · Enrolled full-time or part-time in a secondary school at a school board
- Are participating in a cooperative education placement in an apprenticeship trade

Dual Credit Program

Who can provide this opportunity?

- All publicly funded school boards with secondary schools
- · All Ontario colleges of applied arts and technology

College-delivered dual credit courses: these are college or level 1 apprenticeship programs delivered by a participating publicly funded Ontario college, website: gotocollege.ca/gtccourses.php). For more information, visit ontario.ca/page/dual-credit-programs

Team-taught dual credit course: These courses are delivered jointly by college instructors and high school teachers. Students learn material from the secondary school curriculum and college or apprenticeship curriculum. Paired high school and college courses must have significant content overlap. For more information, please visit ontario.ca/page/dual-credit-programs

Who may be eligible? The school board principal or guidance department oversees which students can take a dual credit program, on a case-by-case basis.

The Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM)

SHSM is a Ministry of Education approved specialized program where students can focus their learning on any one of 19 sectors, such as construction or energy. This program is available in all publicly funded school boards with high schools in the province.

You can get the SHSM seal on your diploma if:

- You complete a specific bundle of 8-10 courses in a selected field
- · You earn industry certifications like first aid and CPR qualifications
- You gain important skills on the job through co-op placements
